Under the current provision Southampton General Hospital serves a population of 895, 176. Under the proposed standalone model Southampton General Hospital would serve a population of 895,000. Under the proposed network model both Southampton General Hospital and the Queen Alexandra Hospital would serve a population of 1, 497,000 across Portsmouth and Southampton.

The views of the Coastal West Sussex Clinical Commissioning Group.

Under the standalone model Portsmouth Hospitals NHS Trust could increase the size of population covered if patients in the Chichester area chose the Portsmouth service. However this would require the majority of Chichester patients to choose Queen Alexandra Hospital in order for the minimum population size to be met. The West Sussex Clinical Commissioning Group has confirmed that it cannot be guaranteed that all Chichester patients would chose to go to Queen Alexandra Hospital and therefore the Portsmouth Stand Alone Model will not cover the 800,000 population required to meet the recommended size of population to generate a sufficient volume of activity.
