## Review of achievement of LPSA targets

## 1) Purpose

1.1 To provide the third overall monitoring report on the achievement of the LPSA targets.

## 2) Recommendations

- 2.1 Members of the panel are asked to:
  - a) consider the achievement of each individual target
  - b) consider whether they would like to invite specific lead officers to future meetings to explore specific targets in more detail

## 3) Background

- 3.1 Portsmouth's LPSA was signed in July 2002. It committed the authority to trying to achieve 13 stretch targets (a number of which have sub-targets) by March 2005 (although a number of targets relate to achievement by the summer 2004 exams). The total performance reward grant is £4.35m (½ capital and ½ revenue) payable over 2 years at the end of the LPSA period if we fully achieve all of our LPSA targets. This means that each of our 13 targets is worth £335,000.
- 3.2 We need to achieve **at least 60% of the stretch** (i.e. the difference between the existing target level and the LPSA target level) on any one target to get a proportion of the performance reward grant for that particular target. A lead officer is responsible for the delivery of each of our targets. They have been allocated a proportion of our pump-priming grant to help achieve their target.
- 3.3 This is the third monitoring report that has been undertaken on the LPSA targets with the previous reports having been undertaken in January and July 2003. It is important that chief officers continue to closely monitor the actions their departments are undertaking to achieve the LPSA targets.
- 3.4 The table later in the report, summarises the lead officer's view on our achievement of each target and also provides additional information where appropriate taken from spreadsheets that lead officers have completed. The Audit Commission have been looking at the council's approach to achieving the LPSA targets as part of their audit of our performance management arrangements. Their interim report states that "these reporting, monitoring and remedial processes are a good basis for moving forward and should continue to be improved".
- 3.5 In order to make the improvements suggested by the Audit Commission each lead officer has been asked to undertake a mid-term review. This review asks them to identify:
  - their exit strategy
  - to consider what has been achieved so far and what still needs to be achieved
  - what the main risks are to stop them hitting the target
  - what controls could minimise the risk
  - what corrective action could help achieve the targets
  - how could others contribute to achieving the target
- 3.6 Issues identified from these reviews have been incorporated into the table that follows in this report.
