		Members are advised that the Gambling Commission has provided advice to the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) in respect of its review of gaming machines and social responsibility measures.	Tel. 9203 4004
		This advice has concluded that a case has been made for action to be taken in respect of Category B2 machines in order to reduce the risk of harm which includes a cut in the maximum amount of stake.	
		Category B2 gaming machines, otherwise known as Fixed Odds Betting Terminals (FOBTs), have a maximum stake of £100, a maximum prize of £500, and a minimum game cycle of 20 seconds. Consumers wishing to stake above £50 with one play must either register to play or follow an over-the-counter process. B2 machines are predominately located in betting shops where numbers are limited to 4 terminals per shop. They can also be located in casinos, although these account for a tiny proportion of the total number of machines.

7		Ultrafast Full Fibre Network and Gigabit Port City Announcement	Greg Povey
		After a year of engagement with the Department for Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) and a competitive bidding process that was open to all councils I am delighted to announce we have been successful in securing an initial £3.9m from DCMS to implement an Ultrafast Full Fibre Network for PCC sites as announced in the Chancellor's Spring Statement. This means Portsmouth will become the first Gigabit Port City on the south coast by enabling gigabit speed, world class connectivity and dramatically accelerating its digital capabilities. 		Further funds, up to £770k, may be available for businesses to apply for vouchers which can be used towards their own connection fees, this will be announced at a later date. In addition soft market testing has identified that once the PCC sites are connected, the selected network provider will add to the investment by expanding the network across Portsmouth in a ratio of up to 10:1, i.e. Portsmouth could see a total invest of £40m plus in our digital infrastructure.

WAND	The new network will also support the market's future mobile 5G network expansion in our city as it enables the necessary data backhaul. Attracting more businesses is key benefit as it will increase the income generated from business rates. 	The other successful English bids were London, Manchester, North Yorkshire, Blackpool, Cambridgeshire, Mid Sussex [Worthing to Crawley], Wolverhampton and a combined bid for Coventry, Solihull and Warwick.	
	The DCMS funding plus our existing revenue budgets that are allocated for connectivity will be repurposed make up the total cost of upgrading the connectivity to all PCC sites, including schools that currently utilise the PCC network, allowing them to have Ultrafast 1Gbps connectivity as standard. This model is known as a public sector "Anchor Tenancy Approach" which aims to build or extend new / existing fibre optic networks in order to connect public sector sites, as well as to potentially foster future expansion for the needs of local homes and businesses.	
	Residential customers and businesses will then benefit from this investment as the PCC sites will provide a Ultrafast network spine across the whole of Portsmouth. This will provide the potential for gigabit connectivity for all our residents and put Portsmouth at the top of the list of cities in the UK when businesses choose where to locate new offices.	
	 Apart from the city wide benefits to business and residents, the Council will also see benefits as the new network will; Remove the dependency on PCC's datacentre as single point of failure, allowing us to resolve a long standing Disaster Recovery issue of reliance on the PCC datacenter. With ASC, CSC and Traffic management in the cloud this will significantly reduce the risk of not being able to access the systems in a Disaster Recovery situation.
