The second representation, sent in support of the proposal, has been received from the Portsmouth Society. They considered that the proposal represents "a thoughtful and creative development which provides useful additional indoor and outdoor	
			living space with little impact on neighbouring properties". Permission is sought for the construction of a mansard roof to form an additional level of accommodation with a roof terrace. The existing building has an unusual relationship with the adjoining dwellings fronting King Street backing directly onto their rear gardens. As such the proposed alterations

In design terms and notwithstanding the comments of the Portsmouth Society, it is considered that the mansard roof and the proposed use of materials would appear incongruous within the street scene, failing to relate in an appropriate manner to both the recipient building and the adjoining properties. As a result it cannot be considered that the proposal would either preserve or enhance the character and appearance of the 'King Street' Conservation Area. It is also considered that the proposal could result in a loss of privacy, although the impact of the roof terrace is reduced due to the placement of the existing windows and an external staircase. It is not considered that the proposal would result in a significant increase in activity at the site.

6	(Cont'd)		Conditional planning permission was granted in January 2010 for the construction of a first floor extension to form an additional floor of accommodation to the rear annex. This application seeks to extend the period in which the development can be commenced. The determining issue is whether any circumstances have changed to warrant withholding permission for the development as previously approved. Since the time of permission in 2010 there have been a number of policy changes, the main two being the introduction of the National Planning Policy Framework and the adoption of the Portsmouth Plan. Having regard to the issues considered previously (which would have included points a-f), it is considered that the changes in policy are such that a decision other than to grant planning permission could not be justified. It is not considered that the other issues raised would justify a reason for refusal. In respect of drawing numbers, it is noted that the previous permission (09/01417/FUL) incorrectly identifies the approved drawings. However, this is considered to the a typographical error and there is no doubt as to which drawings have previously been approved. This error would not invalidate the previous permission and would be corrected as part of a new consent.

		Changes in the Welfare Reform Act 2012 mean that the Community Care Grants and Crisis Loans elements of the Department for Work and Pensions' Social Fund will be abolished in April 2013, and local welfare assistance provision, based on local need, will instead be delivered by Local Authorities in England. As approved by Special Cabinet on the 23 rd July 2012, Portsmouth City Council has now successfully commissioned a provider to deliver its Local Welfare Assistance Scheme.	Tel: 9268 8826
		Northgate will be delivering this service, in partnership with the Family Fund (a registered charity who are experienced in grants allocations for vulnerable families), on behalf of Portsmouth City Council. A full end to end service will be provided. Applications will be made either online or by phone by the person themselves or by their representative. An eligibility checker will be built into the early stages of the process, to establish whether they will meet the criteria for an application. Eligibility criteria are being designed which will broadly follow the current DWP criteria in the first year, until we have established some local learning about priority of need.	
		For those applications that are successful, provision will for the most part be through vouchers, not cash. The Family Fund already has corporate procurement deals in place with organisations, giving better value for money than cash payments to applicants for items.	
		Information will be going up on the PCC website next month, and will form part of wider advice and support information for people who are in financial crisis.
