Transport, Environment and Community Safety Scrutiny Panel Scoping Document

A review into biodiversity enhancement in urban Portsmouth.

1. Background

On 13 October 2021 the Full Council instructed the Traffic, Environment & Community Safety (TECS) Scrutiny Panel to carry out the review this municipal year.

2. Objectives of the inquiry.

This study will review all relevant policies and practices on urban biodiversity that might harm or undermine local ecosystems, such as grass cutting across the city, rewilding on allotment plots to improve habitats for insects, including bees. In general, approaches should aim to positively contribute to re-wilding and support other approaches to re "greening" Portsmouth.
