The strategy aims to better the experience and housing options of anyone who is homeless or threatened with homelessness.

Will any of those groups be affected in a different way to others because of your policy, project, service, function, or strategy?

Successful implementation of the strategy should have a disproportionately positive impact for certain groups of people with protected characteristics, for example: • Preventing more familial evictions would have a positive effect for young people (who disproportionately experience this phenomenon)

- Achieving more successful outcome for those experiencing domestic abuse will have a positive effect for women (who are disproportionately affected by domestic abuse)
- Preventing more homelessness in general and increasing the supply of accommodation that is affordable will improve the rental experience of non-homeowners.
- Targeting specific groups to reduce the likelihood and impact of a negative decisions (such as no priority need or intentional homelessness), e.g. families with children, young people leaving care, those leaving Home Office accommodation should have a positive effect for children, young people, and people of ethnic minority respectively
- Reducing the use of nightly paid and unsuitable temporary accommodation would have a positive effect on those considered priority need which is most commonly families (including children and disproportionate numbers of women) and those with disabilities
- Reviewing the needs (and commissioning options) for specific groups... 1) people who pose a very high risk to staff or members of the public 2) young people with high support needs but who pose a high a risk to other vulnerable young people in a supported housing setting 3) pregnant women assessed as having high support needs or as posing a high risk to others 4) people with high support needs who have experienced domestic abuse 5) people assessed as requiring a controlled drinking requirement

6) adult couples without children 7) people with neurodiversity-related housing support needs 8) Positive impact on certain currently under-served groups - e.g young people, pregnant women, domestic abuse victims (disproportionately women), alcohol often linked to mental health

... will potentially provide for more suitable accommodation for the affected young people, women, born and unborn children, and people with learning and other disabilities.

Implementation of the strategy should be mindful of the following:

- Any protocol for closing cases should be mindful of the different contact methods required by some groups (e.g. those with certain disabilities or those to whom English is not their first language
- Similarly, any prevention hub should be mindful of ease of access for those with disabilities and other protected characteristics
- Any review of the allocations policy for social housingshould be mindful of any negative impact on homeless applicants. Homeless applicants joining the housing register are usually in priority need, and thus more likely to be families (most commonly including women) or have health problems (including disabilities).
- Any review of housing and support provision for roughsleepers and those requiring supported housing will need to consider the respective needs of men and women and give consideration to whether the current provision meets the needs of people with disabilities

We had one-to-one conversations with people who had used homeless services in recent months. The conversations were open to allow for free and in-depth answers, topics included: What was good about the help you received? What help did you not get / what would you change about the help you got?

We separately consulted with some key partner agencies, where questions centred around:

The aims of the existing strategy
What has and has not worked well in achieving those aims
Suggestions for what is required from a new strategy

We then presented the draft strategy for open, city-wide consultation which was advertised on social media and shared directly with key partners and service providers in the city.

How are you going to review the policy, service, project or strategy, how often and who will be responsible? The strategy will be monitored through various governance arrangements including reporting to Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Community, the council's housing and tackling homelessness portfolio, the Health and Wellbeing Board and oversight from the Rough Sleeping and Homelessness Partnership Group.

Increasing the supply of good quality accommodation that is affordable for those who are homeless or threatened with homelessness is central to the strategy. The action plan details how it aims to improve the quality of temporary accommodation and supported accommodation and that it aims to increase the supply of accommodation that is affordable.

How are you going to measure/check the impact of your proposal?

By measuring the number of new homes, the number of affordable PRS properties accessed, the increased supply of more appropriate temporary accommodation.
