
#### Overall Crime Levels in Portsmouth

Police recorded crime had been increasing since 2013/14 but reduced by 2% since 2022/23.

#### BUT

- Not all crime is reported to the police
- The way that police record crime changes over time
- New offences are added (e.g. stalking / coercive control)
- Victims may become more (or less) confident to report some types of crime over time e.g. domestic abuse, sexual offences & hate crime

Consideration of other data sources is important and suggests that overall levels of crime have been fairly stable over the last decade (e.g. local Community Safety Survey).



## Key findings from the update

- Most types of violent crime have reduced or remained broadly stable since 2021/22.
- Possession of a weapon offences increased by 9% impacted by police activity.
- Domestic abuse continues to be the largest known driver of violence (40% of assaults)
- Domestic abuse reported to the police appears to be stabilising, but there is still
  work to be done to challenge, support and hold domestic abuse perpetrators to
  account.
- Children at risk of criminal exploitation has increased since 2021/22.
- Increase in vehicle crime and a likely increase in shoplifting since 2021/22.


## Serious Violence Strategic Needs Assessment






- Serious Violence duty for responsible authorities to work together to prevent and reduce serious violence, produce a strategic needs assessment (SNA) and a strategy.
- Collaborative bottom-up approach to the SNA:
   Analysts from Portsmouth, Southampton, IOW & Hampshire, VRU analyst and OPCC.
- Portsmouth's SNA is situated in the Partnership Strategic Assessment Update.

#### Serious Violence in Portsmouth






- There were 1,035 serious violence offences in 2022/23, giving a rate of 5 per 1,000.
- 40% possession of a weapon, 30% violence with injury and 26% were robbery of personal property.
- Similar level as 2021/22, but higher than pre-covid levels.
- Increases since 2018/19 have been driven by increases in robbery and possession of a weapon offences.

#### What do we know about serious violence?

- Serious violence is concentrated in the City Centre and surrounding neighbourhoods.
- Higher levels from Friday night to Sunday and in the evenings, 60% known to be in public places - NTE as a main driver
- Where relationship between the victim and suspect were recorded: 37% strangers,
   29% were victimless, 18% acquaintances, 15% ex-partners/partners/family.
- Young males aged between 18 and 34 years were most affected by serious violence, both as victims and suspects.
- There has also been an increase from 2021/22 in young victims and suspects aged between 10 and 17 years.
- Portsmouth also compares poorly with the Hampshire and England averages for many
  of the measures associated with an increased likelihood of violence

#### **Anti-social Behaviour**



Substantial and sustained reduction in ASB reported to the police.

Other agencies have seen an increase in ASB reports, but still a large shortfall in reported ASB.

**BUT** 

Data from the Community Safety Survey says levels are fairly stable.

## Recommended Community Safety Priorities

- Tackling violent crime, focussing on violence against women and girls, domestic abuse, knife-enabled violence, and sexual violence
- Tackling drug-related harm, with a focus on increasing access to treatment and closer working across physical and mental healthcare.
- Early identification of and interventions with children and young people at risk of exploitation or abuse, of misusing substances and of offending
- Improve accessibility and capacity of mental health provision for children, young people and adults.
- Increase the awareness of cyber-related harm
